Summary of comments explaining why:

The comments supporting HPE specialists in primary schools were many with 90% of Western Australian Catholic Education principals preferring to have a HPE specialist teacher in their school. Principals who did not prefer to have a specialist



HPE teacher were both from medium sized primary schools (100 - 300 children). A comment was made relating the availability of the position to the school budget.

Comments suggested that quality was provided through expertise, knowledge of the subject, priority of the learning area, skill development, motivation, safety, sport coordination and to enable a developmentally appropriate and consistent program. Also, it was mentioned that some classroom teachers' knowledge and ability in HPE can vary greatly. Often, setting up equipment and general coordination can be difficult for classroom teachers and having a HPE specialist is valued by school communities. Many HPE specialists are responsible for the physical education strand only with the class teacher being responsible for Health Education.

Teacher has specialist knowledge of skills based education program, rather than classroom teacher. Knowledge of classroom teachers in this field can vary greatly. Health is usually taught by our classroom teachers as part of an integrated program. We run a Rainbows program using a social worker. PE is coordinated by a specialist teacher.



On hand to support staff & students. Expertise in school also allows for greater flexibility.

To promote and implement a high quality HPE program for all students We have a specialist PE teacher because of the skills of the teacher requiring certain proficiency & safety issues. HE (Health Education) is conducted by the class teacher as it is best to keep in their lesson profile so they can reinforce during the class's other lessons
